With a its headquarters in Hargeisa and sub-offices in Burao, Erigavo, and Jigjiga (Ethiopia), as well as a liaison office in Nairobi, Kenya, Candlelight has developed an extensive network to reach some of the most underserved communities. 
Our interventions are alignedwith global best practices and policy frameworks, particularly the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), including SDG 1 (No Poverty), SDG 2 (Zero Hunger), SDG 4(Quality Education), SDG 5 (GenderEquality), and SDG 13 (ClimateAction). Additionally, our efforts contribute directly to the Somaliland National Development Plan III (2023-2027), which emphasizes economic empowerment, environmental sustainability, education, and gender equality as key pillars for national progress. Through rights-based and community-centered approaches, we strive to enhance resilience, promote inclusive development, and drive systemic change while supporting Somaliland's long-term vision for sustainable growth and prosperity.



Environmental Protection and Climate Resilience Climate Resilience Through Nature-Based Solutions and **Community Action**

Our integrated approach combines community-driven interventions in water access, land rehabilitation, climate adaptation training, and local governance to build climate-resilient and empowered communities. By strengthening natural resource management, enhancing disaster

preparedness, and promoting sustainable livelihoods, these efforts enable communities to effectively respond to environmental challenges and secure a more sustainable future.

Key Interventions and Achievements:

Enhancing Water Resources for Land Restoration: We improved existing and constructed new water sources such as dams and water storage pools, boosting reliable water availability. This supports better resource management and aids regeneration of degraded landscapes, strengthening climate resilience and ecosystem health.

Disaster Risk Reduction and Climate Adaptation Training: 1,330 received training in climate-smart agriculture, water conservation, and early warning systems, with half being women. A contingency fund was also established to enhance community preparedness for climate challenges.

Cash-for-Work and Land Rehabilitation: Our Cash-for-Work programs engaged 537 household heads in the rehabilitation and construction of soil bunds across 676 hectares—restoring degraded land and providing vital economic benefits. These efforts have equipped communities to enhance soil health, biodiversity, and fodder production, contributing to greater climate resilience.

Sustainability and Local Governance: Local Water Management Committees now oversee water infrastructure, ensuring sustainable and fair resource use. A learning exchange with 40 participants, including 30% women, strengthened local knowledge and natural resource stewardship.

Community-led Preparedness and Response: Early warning committees and community action plans were established, enhancing local capacity to respond to climate risks. These efforts foster resilience and help protect livelihoods and ecosystems.

These combined actions demonstrate our commitment to building sustainable, resilient communities through locally led and inclusive approaches.

Ali's Story of Land Restoration and Hope in Muuqdheer



In Muuqdheer village, where drought and land degradation have devastated pastoral livelihoods, a quiet transformation is taking place. Ali Mahamed Ahmed, a father of five children and respected elderly, whose journey reflects resilience and the strength of community-led restoration.

"Our pasturelands were dying," Ali recalls. "Rain became infrequent, the soil dried, and the grass disappeared." Like many others, he struggled to keep his livestock alive—the backbone of his family's livelihood.

When the Cash-for-Work (CfW) program under the Climate-Resilient WASH and Livelihoods Package launched, Ali was among the first to join. It provided temporary income and practical training to restore degraded rangelands.

With basic tools and strong resolve, Ali and his group rehabilitated over 25 hectares of land—building half-moon soil bunds and planting grass to help the land recover. "Each morning, I feel I'm contributing to something greater for my family and future generations," he says.

The CfW program provides Ali with a reliable income of \$153 per 18-day work cycle, repeated three times a year. This support not only sustains his family but also contributes to the revival of community rangelands.

Sustainable Livelihood & Economic Development

Economic empowerment is a cornerstone of poverty reduction and long-term resilience. In response to the interconnected challenges of climate change and economic vulnerability, our livelihood interventions targeted food security, income diversification, and financial inclusion to support vulnerable communities to better withstand and recover from shocks.

Key Interventions and Achievements:

Climate-Resilient Agriculture & Food Security: Sixty smallholder farms have achieved significant growth thanks to climate-adaptive seed varieties, translating unpredictable rains into consistent yield gains. The installation of 170 modern grain silos has slashed post-harvest losses allowing families to retain and market a greater share of their harvests, bolstering household nutrition and income stability

Livestock Health & Productivity: In a sweeping animal-health campaign, over 10,000 herd members received vital vaccinations, driving down disease incidence and mortality. By safeguarding livestock assets, pastoralists enjoy renewed economic confidence and stronger community livelihoods.





Financial Inclusion and Economic Empowerment: Six thriving Village Savings and Loan Associations are empowering communities by providing accessible, community-driven credit and savings opportunities that fuel grassroots entrepreneurship. Among these groups, 30 percent are led by women who have mobilized \$3,000 in seed capital to launch livestock businesses and small shops, creating new income opportunities. Additionally, 40 women completed Ministry of Trade-led training in finance and policy, emerging as empowered entrepreneurs and influential leaders driving inclusive and sustainable economic growth.

Amina's Journey to Economic Empowerment



Amina, a mother of three children from Duruqsi Village, supporting her family through a small household goods shop. Her life was transformed through determination and the support of Candlelight's BREACH project and her Village Savings and Loan Association (VSLA).

Before joining the VSLA in 2024, Amina struggled with limited inventory and minimal savings, making it difficult to meet her family's basic needs. With EU-funded support, the group provided her with a loan that allowed her to expand and diversify her shop's offerings.

The impact was immediate. With improved stock, Amina attracted more customers, increased her income, and successfully repaid the loan. She now saves regularly and can provide food, clothing, and education for her children. Amina's story is a powerful example of how VSLAs can empower women to achieve financial independence and create lasting, positive change in their communities.

Abdiqadir's Journey: From Struggle to Strength Through Climate-Smart Farming

Abdiqadir Ismail Nur, from Magaalo-qalo, endured years of shrinking sorghum harvests as rising temperatures and erratic rains threatened his family's food security. Hope came with the introduction of Tukhom Masaggo Yar, a drought-resistant Proso millet variety. After hands-on training in planting, soil care, and post-harvest handling, Abdiqadir embraced this new farming method. Within one season, his struggling fields produced a rich harvest, providing enough food for his family and surplus to sell, bringing financial stability and pride.

His transformation has inspired neighboring farmers to try Proso millet. Abdiqadir's story is a shining example of how innovation and determination can build resilience, strengthen community food security, and create lasting change.

Education and Vocational Training

Candlelight is transforming formal education in Somaliland by removing barriers for underserved and marginalized communities. Through comprehensive programs that expand access and foster lifelong learning, the organization is empowering countless learners to unlock their full potential and build brighter futures

Primary and Secondary Schools

Candlelight runs primary and secondary schools in Burao and Erigavo, offering a strong curriculum that builds essential academic skills and confidence. The organization prioritizes inclusive education, especially for displaced and impoverished children, providing scholarships and motivational programs to promote gender equality. These efforts create safe and supportive classrooms where all students can participate and grow. By combining quality education with empowerment, Candlelight is striving to nurture the next generation of leaders in Somaliland.

Enrollments and Completion

Since the program's inception, Candlelight's schools have enrolled over 1,550 students, with 85% completing each academic term successfully. The organization has seen a steady increase in enrollment rates, especially among girls, thanks to targeted scholarship and outreach efforts.

Success Rates and Academic Achievement:

Students at Candlelight's schools consistently perform above regional averages. In recent years over 75% of students have passed national examinations with satisfactory or higher grades. Many graduates have proceeded to higher education or vocational training, equipped with strong foundational knowledge and skills.











Skills Development and Vocational Training

Candlelighthas been at the forefrontof Technical and Vocational Educationand Training (TVET) programs, equipping vulnerable youth with market-driven skills to enhance employment opportunities and economic independence. Candlelight's inclusive learning centers are situated in Hargeisa, Burao, and Erigavo and are equipped with appropriate tools necessary for effective training and skills development. Our center has provided thousands of young men and women with hands-on industry-relevant training.

Candlelight's Vocational Training Centers (VTCs) are leading the way in addressing youth and women's unemployment in Somaliland by equipping marginalized communities with the skills needed to build sustainable futures. This year 450 trainees (270 men and 180 women) successfully completed training in vital fields including plumbing, tailoring, cooking, electricity, and entrepreneurship. With a unique focus on practical, market-relevant skills, Candlelight's programs are empowering individuals to not only secure employment but to become agents of change within their communities.

Key Achievements:

- Diverse training programs equipped 450 individuals with practical skills in tailoring, plumbing, electricity and event decoration 60% of the trainees were young men, while 40% were women.
- Comprehensive Skill Development: Trainees receive both technical and soft skills training, such
 as entrepreneurship, communication, and problem-solving, ensuring readiness for the job
 market.
- Real-World Experience: Internship opportunities bridge the gap to employment, with many trainees transitioning directly into permanent roles.

Impact on Individuals and Communities: Graduates of Candlelight's VTCs are not only improving their own economic independence but also contributing to the financial stability of their families and communities. The ripple effect of this empowerment fosters local development and creates role models who inspire the next generation.

Addressing Youth Unemployment: By providing targeted skills and entrepreneurship training, Candlelight's VTCs are actively combating the youth unemployment crisis, equipping participants with the tools to thrive in both the job market and as businessowners.

Candlelight's Vocational Training Centers are transforming lives, communities, and futures. Every graduate is a testament to the power of education and skills in overcoming barriers and shaping a prosperous, self-reliant Somaliland.

Sahal's Journey to Skills Empowerment



Sahal Rashid, a young man living with a physical disability, graduated from Candlelight's Hargeisa Vocational Training Center after completing Level 1 training in tailoring. Despite the challenge of limited mobility in his left leg, Sahal was determined to build a better future through skills and determination.

With few resources but strong ambition, he launched a small tailoring business in his neighborhood.

Starting with just one sewing machine, Sahal offered clothing alterations and custom designs—gradually building a loyal customer base through the quality and care he put into every piece.

Today, his tailor shop stands as a powerful symbol of resilience and self-reliance. Through his craft, Sahal not only supports himself but also inspires others with disabilities to pursue their goals and believe in their potential. His journey is a testament to the transformative power of vocational training in empowering individuals to improve their lives and contribute meaningfully to their communities

Health and Nutrition

Candlelight'shealth and nutritioninterventions in Somaliland emphasized emergency response, preventive care, and capacity building. Aligned with SDG3 (Good Health and Well-being), we reached 21,695 individuals across Sool and Togdheer, focusing on women, children, and displaced communities.

Key Achievements:

Candlelight's health and nutrition interventions in Somaliland delivered life-saving care while buildinglong-term community resilience. In a context marked by chronic food insecurity and fragile health systems, our approach combined emergency response, disease prevention, and health system strengthening, reaching over 21,695 individuals in Awdal, Togdheer, and Sool with a sharp focus onwomen, children, and displaced populations.

Nutrition Response: We screened 15,052 individuals for acute malnutrition, including 10,882 children under five and 4,170 pregnant and lactating women. Using ready-to-use therapeutic and supplementary foods, we treated 557 cases of Severe Acute Malnutrition and 4,310 cases of Moderate Acute Malnutrition. Maternal nutrition services reached 2,697 pregnant and lactating women with counseling and supplements, reducing maternal health complications by 40 percent. Our nutrition-sensitive programming addressed malnutrition's root causes by promoting dietary diversity, improving access to nutritious foods, and strengthening household resilience. For severe cases, 641 individuals were referred for specialized care, and 413 vulnerable patients received mobile money support to overcome access barriers.

Immunization and Disease Prevention: In partnership with the Ministry of Health, we vaccinated 7,205 individuals against high-risk diseases including polio, measles, and tetanus. Our clinical outreach treated 7,664 people for common yet dangerous illnesses such as respiratory infections, diarrheal disease, anemia, and skin conditions to reduce and treat preventable illness across targeted communities.

Strengthening Health Systems: To reinforce local health infrastructure, six health facilities were supplied with essential medical equipment and consumables, enhancing care for more than 12,000 patients. Additionally, 35 frontline health workers were trained in clinical management protocols, while 20 community mobilizers led over 70 health awareness sessions, reaching 8,000+ caregivers with messages on nutrition, hygiene, and early care-seeking.

Gender & Protection

andlelight is advancing gender equality and safeguarding vulnerable groups through a comprehensive, community-driven approach that confronts harmful norms, strengthens protection systems, and empowerswomen and childrento lead secure, dignified lives. By integrating legal advocacy, economic empowerment, education, and grassroots mobilization, our work is shifting mindsets and transforming realities in some of the most underserved communities.

Key Achievements:

Eliminating FGM/C and Gender-Based Violence (GBV): Through sustained advocacy, education, and legal intervention, Candlelight continues to contribute to reducing the prevalence of female genital mutilation/cutting (FGM/C). This shift reflects the power of coordinated action: 40 Child Protection Committee members were trained to lead local response efforts, and 20 GBV survivors received cash support to access medical care and legal aid. Public awareness has expanded through televised and radio discussions, reaching over 6,100 individuals with vital messages on child rights and legal protection. Our engagement with religious and traditional leaders has resulted in public commitments to abandon FGM/C, marking a critical step toward long-term cultural change.

Protecting and Empowering Children: Candlelight has strengthened school-based child rights clubs, trained educators, and actively involved students in awareness campaigns that cultivate leadership and advocacy skills. Child rights competitions reached 130 students, while posters, brochures, and mentorship initiatives extended the impacta cross classrooms and communities, creating a safer environment where children's voices are heard and their rights upheld.

Economic Empowerment as a Path to Equality: Recognizing that true equality begins with economic opportunity, Candlelight supported 80 women through self-help groups offering financial literacy, access to micro-grants, and small business development training. Women-led milk cooperatives received critical support to improve storage and refrigeration infrastructure, and 15 women were equipped with skills in climate-resilient agriculture, enabling them to secure income and strengthen food systems. These initiatives also paved the way for women to take leadership roles in Natural Resource Management (NRM) committees and gain greater autonomy in household decision-making. Strategic partnerships with the Ministry of Trade helped women-led businesses achieve formal certification under MESAF standards, opening new market avenues.

Building Community Commitment to Protection and Equality: Candlelight's awareness campaigns and training through Village Savings and Loan Associations (VSLAs) have deepened community understanding of gender rights, inclusion, and shared responsibility. In Ceeg and Mureec, five tripartite protected-area contracts were signed by 46 stakeholders including the Ministry of Environment and Climate Change (MoECC), village elders, and Land Restoration Management Committees (LRMCs) committing to 24-month site closures. These agreements not only promote environmental stewardship but also embed inclusive governance and protection principles into local decision-making structures.

Candlelight's gender and protection interventions aim to create lasting change by institutionalizing community protection mechanisms, supporting legal frameworks like the Child Rights Act, and strengthening women's economic resilience. Through strategic partnerships, community engagement, and sustained advocacy, we ensure that gender equality and protection remain central to our mission. With continued donor support, we can expand our impact and build a future where all individuals live free from violence and discrimination.

Peace Building and Conflict Resolution

Fostering Peace and Resilience in conflict prone communities

Candlelight adopts an integrated nexus approach that recognizes the critical link between natural resource management and peacebuilding. By addressing the root causes of resource-based conflicts, this approach helps reduce tensions, strengthen community cohesion, and promote transparent, effective stewardship of natural assets. Candlelight is dedicated to nurturing peace and resolving conflicts in Somaliland by empowering communities to manage resources sustainably and address disputes constructively. Through inclusive training programs and awareness sessions, we equip individuals with the skills needed to monitor resources and mediate conflicts, fostering harmony and resilience in regions prone to disputes.

Key Achievements:

- Strengthened the capacity of 89 community members—including 45% women—in regions
 prone to resource-based conflict by delivering targeted training on protected-area
 management, resource monitoring, and conflict resolution, laying the groundwork for long-term
 environmental stewardship and local peacebuilding.
- Convened two strategic community dialogues in the conflict-prone areas of Ceeg and Mureec, engaging 50 participants (30% women) to raise awareness of escalating natural resource tensions and co-develop actionable, community-led strategies for preventing conflict and fostering sustainable, peaceful coexistence.

These initiatives underscore Candlelight's commitment to building peaceful, resilient communities through education, empowerment, and proactive conflict management.

Conclusion

Our interventions in 2024 have contributed to transforming landscapes, empowering individuals, and built resilient communities. However, our work is far from over. Moving forward, we have planned to:

- Expand TVET programs to create more employment opportunities.
- Scale up climate adaptation initiatives to enhance food security.
- Strengthen women-led economic enterprises for financial inclusion.
- Enhance advocacy and policy engagement for legal protections and systemic change.
